Athens Area Trail Association was formed in 2014 to help protect, promote and maintain the robust silent sports trail system within the Village of Athens. Since its inception, the association (AATA) has added winter grooming equipment, new trails, and wayfinding improvements. In its quest to provide more services and keep trails in tip top shape, AATA has identified that a flail mower capable of reaching outward and angling would work best for summer trail maintenance. AATA has received a robust 50% donation from the Athens Lions Club and is looking for additional funding to cover the remaining costs of this piece of equipment.

The angled flail/ditch mower will keep trails wide, clean, and neat. Keeping the trails clear of vegetation is imperative. Vegetation can inhibit skiing in the winter poking through the groomed trail such as raspberry plants. Vegetation can also work its way in form the sides of the trails, creating narrowing of areas. These areas keep the trail dark and moist adding to additional conditions that work to degrade trails surfaces creating instability and areas prone to wash outs.

The flail mower with the ability to offset outside of the tractor wheels and angle is the best piece of equipment. The flail mower allows the tractor being used to pull the mower to remain on the solid trail surfaces while the mower is outside of the wheel line working to clear vegetation on the sides of the trail. The proposed mower also has the ability to mow downward on a 60 degree down angle that allows it to hug contours of the trail edge that might drop off. The mower also will raise and work on a 90 degree up angle allowing the user to work down a hedge or tree line keeping branches and taller vegetation at bay. The mower can handle material up to two inches in diameter, making it a very heavy duty piece of equipment.

This mower will help to maintain approximately 10 miles of trails within the Odyssey Trail System. This system circumnavigates around the Village of Athens. The system provides silent sports opportunities for residents of north Marathon County, the Village of Athens as well as residents that travel from Taylor, Lincoln or Wood counties. The Odyssey Trail System is also utilized by Athens High School for WIAA sanctioned cross country events, Athens Fair Fun Run-Walk, AATA's Annual Candlelight Walk and Gobble Wobble, IronBull's Red Granite Grinder as well as the Big Poniatowski gravel bike trail.

They have donated in the past for play ground projects and shelter maintenance for village parks. They have made a 50% donation for this mower as they believe in the work that AATA is doing and the impact it has on our small community. Athens Area Trail Association will contribute an amount of at least \$100 dollars to ensure the equipment is well marked with parties that donated toward it. Additionally, Central Wisconsin Powersports discounted the unit by an additional \$175.

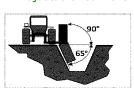

Each season, Summit Players Theatre presents our Shakespeare in the State Parks Tour. This tour's goal is to present free, accessible Shakespeare performances and workshops throughout the Wisconsin State Parks. Summit's free of charge touring format breaks down the two largest barriers to entry to the arts - cost and geography. Summit's programming addresses the need for high quality, accessible arts education and performances in Wisconsin. Part of Summit's mission is to bring residents to the state parks and give the public a greater appreciation for Wisconsin's natural lands. As part of Summit's 2025 tour, we plan to hold an educational workshop and a free performance of Shakespeare's Love's Labour's Lost at Rib Mountain State Park. With this tour, Summit aims to provide free performances for 2,000 residents and free workshops for 300 participants. In Marathon County, we expect 200 residents to attend our performance at Rib Mountain State Park, and 30 to attend our workshop. This programming is designed to be accessible to all, but has particular benefits for low income residents, rural residents, and families with children.

Summit's programming is broken down into two main components: the workshop and the performance. Before each show, Summit's actors will host a free Shakespeare workshop designed for children and families, but open to all. This workshop covers the life and works of William Shakespeare, the plot and characters of the play they are about to see, and how to read and interpret Shakespeare's writing styles. Participants will engage in a series of games and activities, led by Summit's actor educators. This workshop is designed for learners of all kinds with activities for visual, aural, and kinesthetic learners. This forty five minute workshop is designed to be a primer for the upcoming performance, with the goal of heightening an audience's comprehension and enjoyment of performance and Shakespeare in general.

Each summer, Summit presents a shortened version of one of the works of William Shakespeare in the State Parks. This performance is designed with accessibility in mind, is shortened from the usual three hours to seventy five minutes, and is presented without an intermission. Summit's script adapter, Maureen Kilmurry makes judicious cuts to the script, removing outdated jokes and references, and redundancies, while maintaining the core plot, characters, and language of the show. Audience members are invited to participate in the show, providing atmospheric sound effects when prompted by the actors. This performance is presented free of charge and brings together community members of all ages, races, socioeconomic backgrounds, and previous theatre experiences. After each show, the actors hold a short question and answer session, discussing the show, William Shakespeare, or their work in a professional theatre company.

Fundraising for the 2025 season began in the summer of 2024, with the earliest grant applications due in August. These applications will continue until mid April for Summit's 2025 season. Summit's administrative team met with our board in December to discuss season selection and chose Love's Labour's Lost from a panel of five potential shows. Each season, Summit will make offers to previous cast members and designers in January for the upcoming season. Roughly half the cast each season have previously worked with Summit and bringing back seasoned artists helps maintain institutional knowledge and Summit's high standards for performances on tour. Casting for remaining roles will take place in February with Summit's touring cast and creative team solidified in early March.

Rehearsals for Love's Labour's Lost will begin on May 5th, 2025. Cast members will rehearse for four weeks, learning the blocking, themes, music, dance, and any fight choreography for the performance. Cast members will also work with Summit's Education Director Caroline Norton on our educational workshops. This includes discussing curriculum, practicing the exercises used in the workshops, and running mock workshops. Performances for Love's Labour's Lost will begin on June 13th, 2025. Summit's cast will tour for six weekends throughout the summer (with one break weekend for the Fourth of July). Summit's tour will present performances in eighteen state parks across Wisconsin in urban, suburban, and rural counties. Throughout the tour Summit's cast will have occasional brush up rehearsals with our director to ensure the performance is maintaining its shape and quality.

Funding from the Wausau and Marathon County Parks and Recreation Foundation would help cover expenses associated with Summit's performance at Rib Mountain State Park. These expenses include wages for our touring cast, gas, van rental fees, production expenses for props, sets, and costumes, and other touring expenses. This funding helps ensure that Summit's performances can be presented free-of-charge to residents of Marathon County.

Duplication of Services*

Are there any similar projects currently operating in the community? If so, how is your program different, and why is it needed?

While there are other Shakespeare companies in Wisconsin including American Players Theatre, Door Shakespeare, Optimist Theatre and others, Summit is the only theatre dedicated to performing exclusively in the Wisconsin State Parks. Part of our mission is to bring attention to the underappreciated and underutilized facilities at the Wisconsin State Parks. Performances with Summit Players Theatre drive traffic to the state parks and when surveyed, over 97% of audience members state they would come to the park again. A performance with Summit Players Theatre can give young people an appreciation of Shakespeare, the arts, and Wisconsin's natural lands. Furthermore, Summit has had a long history of performing in Marathon County with the 2025 season being Summit's tenth year performing at Rib Mountain State Park. This performance has consistently attracted large audiences to Rib Mountain State Park, consistently attracting audiences of over 150 people. Summit offers unique services through our Shakespeare in the Parks Tour, and has a unique and longstanding relationship with Rib Mountain State Park and the residents of Marathon County.

Summit is an affiliate member of the United Performing Arts Fund, the largest funder of the arts in the state of Wisconsin. Each season Summit receives funding through UPAF to fund our Shakespeare in the State Parks tour. Summit will do outreach for UPAF at their annual fundraising events.

This summer Summit will be collaborating with local theatres to help raise awareness about upcoming performances. Summit will receive social media shout outs and inclusion on the email lists of Milwaukee Repertory Theatre, Next Act Theatre, and First Stage Children's Theatre in exchange for similar coverage from Summit. These collaborations will help raise awareness about each theatre's works to other audience members. Summit is also a member of the Milwaukee Theatre Alliance, a consortium of small theatre companies in the Milwaukee area, the Milwaukee Theatre Alliance hosts auditions and professional networking events which Summit takes part in.

Summit has historically partnered with Jeweler's Mutual Insurance Charitable Giving Fund in Appleton, WI to offer "Free Admission Days" at performances at High Cliff State Park. Funding from Jeweler's Mutual Fund goes to subsidize the \$8/car admission fee to the state park. This collaboration helps remove one of the final economic barriers to the arts and encourages residents to visit High Cliff State Park. Since Summit performs in the state parks and helps bring residents to the parks, Summit receives an in kind donation of camping permits from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources for the season. Cast members will camp at the parks after performances. In addition, park rangers will help spread the word about performances by posting signage and including performance times in listings in the parks.

Long-Term Strategies

What are the long-term strategies for continuation and funding of this project at the end of the grant period?

Summit applies for a range of grant funding from public organizations and private foundations across the state of Wisconsin. This funding process is year round, with funding for our 2026 season beginning in August of 2025. These grant applications include state and local organizations and Summit is currently applying for a \$15,000 Shakespeare in American Communities Grant from Arts Midwest for our 2026 Season. This wide range of grants ensures that Summit can continue providing high quality arts education and performances to Wisconsin Residents free of charge.

In August of 2024, Summit held its first fundraising gala. This event brought together artists, donors, and other friends of the company to celebrate Summit's Ten Year Anniversary and raise funds for Summit's future endeavors. Through a silent auction, raffle, and fundraising drive, this event raised over \$8,000 to help fund Summit's 2025 season. Summit's administrative team plans to continue throwing these sorts of events to help cultivate our donor base and fund future seasons. In addition, Summit's virtual Giving Tuesday Drive helped raise over \$1,000 from Summit's donors and supporters.

Summit also has a number of loyal monthly donors. These donors elect to make recurring contributions and they provide Summit with roughly \$300 per month in donations. This reliable income stream helps the Summit budget for future projects. These recurring donations, combined with fundraiser drives and yearlong grant applications helps Summit continue to fund our work. Maintaining and expanding these revenue streams is core to Summit's long term plans to continue providing free performances in the parks.

Summit's largest budget item is pay for our personnel. This season, Summit will hire six actors for four weeks of rehearsal and six weeks of performances at a rate of \$250/week. A production manager will be hired for four weeks of rehearsals and six weeks of performances at \$275/week. A tour manager will be hired at a rate of \$137.50 for three weeks, and a rate of \$275/week for the remaining seven weeks. The tour manager is primarily responsible for driving the van, serving as Summit's point of contact at parks, and welcoming audiences to performances, as such the pay rate is increased to reflect the added responsibilities. There are a number of other personnel who will be paid a stipend for their work as they will primarily be working during the four week rehearsal period and will not be joining the cast on tour once performances begin. These roles include our director paid \$4,150, our scenic designer paid at \$1,600, our costume designer paid at \$1,600, our music coordinator paid at \$1,600, our fight director paid at \$1,000, and our intimacy director paid at \$1,000.

Summit carries General Liability Insurance during the duration of rehearsals and performances coming to a total of \$925 for the season. Summit also carries Worker's Compensation Insurance during the duration of our summer season costing \$2,750.00. Summit will carry auto liability insurance during the six week tour, totaling \$315.00.

Summit spends money on advertising throughout the summer to help raise awareness for our programming and bring audiences to Summit's public performances. These include advertisements on social media and running weekly ads through Meta on Facebook and Instagram. Summit budgets \$50 per weekend for digital ads, or \$300 over the course of the summer. These ads are region specific and target areas where Summit will be performing week by week. Physical advertisements are purchased as well, including postcards and posters sent to Parks Departments for display at welcome centers. Printing and mailing is needed for these physical ads. Summit uses yard signs to help direct traffic to the performance areas and to provide audiences with a

short synopsis of the show for those who may not have attended the preshow workshop. Summit's physical marketing comes to \$1,250.00.

Each season Summit purchases a variety of materials to produce each show. These may include fabric for costumes, rentals from other theater's costume departments, lumber for set construction, and purchasing copies of the script for the cast.

This summer Summit will rent a fifteen seater van from Enterprise for the six week tour. Group meals during tour are included during the budget and are to be purchased and prepared by the tour manager for each weekend of tour. The budget for group meals is \$250 each weekend for six weekends. Hotel stays are included in the budget for cases in which the players cannot stay at state parks that do not have campgrounds or the necessary facilities. Additional hotel stays are included in the budget in case of severe inclement weather.

Project Income:

As Summit offers performances for free, funding is primarily secured through grants. Given the touring nature of Summit's work and the wide range of communities that Summit serves, a wide range of organizations are solicited for grants. These grants allow Summit to provide all performances and workshops to community members completely free of charge. Currently, Summit Players have secured funding through the following foundations and public grants:

These grants total to \$51,950 is pending funding for Summit Player's 2025 season. As the grant application process is highly competitive, Summit will always apply for more grants than it expects to receive. From these grants Summit expects to receive the remaining \$22,500 needed for our 2025 Season. The largest of these grants comes from Wisconsin Humanities which has historically funded Summit's work through their major grant program.

After each performance Summit collects donations from the audience. These include cash donations as well as credit and debit card donations taken by our tour manager through a Square card reader. Based on previous performances we expect to take in roughly \$1,000 a weekend in individual donations and would expect \$6,000 in donations this summer. Summit will also take online donations through DonorBox, these may include one time donations or monthly recurring donations. Board members make yearly contributions as part of their time on the board.

In Kind Donations:

Each season Summit receives in kind donations from organizations that support our work. Summit receives an in kind donation from Marquette University each season for the use of the Helfaer Theatre for the four week rehearsal process and additional brush up and understudy rehearsals during the tour. This donation is valued at \$7,600.

The Summit Players' mission is to present free, accessible, innovative theatre to families around Wisconsin and spark a love of language in minds of all ages. The players use theatre as a learning medium and introduce children to a passion for language, communicating, and constructive play, while providing adults with an enjoyable theatrical experience. The only company in the country focused on touring a production through state parks, the Summit Players build connections between Shakespeare, the outdoors, and fun. To do so, we seek innovative and original ways to perform, to connect the classics to our contemporary time.

Founded in 2015, Summit Players Theatre began as the senior capstone project of a group of Marquette students. Their goal was to bring free, educational Shakespeare to Wisconsin residents by performing in often underutilized and underappreciated amphitheaters in Wisconsin State Parks. These students had a belief that Shakespeare is meant to be enjoyed by everyone, regardless of race, education, geography, socioeconomic status, or previous theatre experience. From this idea came Summit's free of charge, educational Shakespeare model.

Since 2015 Summit Players Theatre has produced one of the works of William Shakespeare each summer, and toured it to state parks throughout Wisconsin. There they would provide free educational workshops to children and families before presenting a shortened, seventy-five minute cutting of a Shakespeare play. The actors also hold preshow educational workshops designed for children and families to further deepen audiences comprehension and enjoyment of performances. Summit seeks to dispel the notion that Shakespeare is boring or that theatre is an academic, upper class interest.

As an organization Summit has historically been dedicated to pay equity and paying artists a living wage. In a short span of time Summit has quickly become one of Milwaukee's highest paying non-union companies for actors and designers. Many of these are early career artists and a contract with Summit helps provide crucial professional development for young artists and bolsters the Milwaukee theatre community.

Over the course of ten years, Summit has produced a range of Shakespeare's works including: A Midsummer Night's Dream, Romeo and Juliet, A Winter's Tale, Much Ado About Nothing, Comedy of Errors, and Macbeth. Summit has only had one interruption in programming during 2020, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. During that time Summit hosted, "No Bummer Summer", a series of virtual lessons about the life and works of William Shakespeare. Since 2015 Summit has provided free performances for over 15,000 audience members and workshops for more than 4,500 participants. In this time Summit has built long lasting relationships with the state parks, community members, and arts organizations to provide free, educational, and excellent Shakespeare performances in the Wisconsin State Parks.

The proposed project is a parking facility and ADA compliant water craft launching site on the Eau Claire River. This is the furthest upstream area of the Eau Claire River which is included as a portion of the Great Pinery Heritage Water Trail. The GPHWT is a state water trail (attempting to receive recognition as a national water trail) which extends over 100 miles along the Wisconsin River and includes portions of the Eau Claire and Rib Rivers within the metro Wausau area. In 2016, the Village of Weston began actively promoting the Eau Claire River Water Trail locally and regionally. The Community Foundation was part of the funding for the first developed launch site on the Eau Claire River at Ross Avenue. The Village has since received a donation of a 3 acre parcel on the Eau Claire River at County Road I where they developed the Silver Creek Farm parking area and launch. None of the launches on the Eau Claire are ADA compliant except for the last launch in the City of Schofield near the mouth of the river. Because of the variety of flora, fauna and water conditions downstream of this location, Yellowbanks Park is a great location for an ADA accessible launch. From Yellowbanks downstream, a paddler encounters some fast water, riffles and strong current as well as slower flowage-like current and backwaters teeming with critters as they approach the mouth of the river. The river flow in this area (as on most rivers) can be too fast for safe paddling during snow melt or significant precipitation. Conversely, the location of this launch within the watershed guarantees that the water doesn't get too low to have a fun paddle downstream even during extended periods without precipitation. Signage with website references will be placed at the launch location to provide information relative to river flows and safety.

Current condition: Yellowbanks Park has over 1/2 mile of frontage on the Eau Claire River. The current launch site is in the location of the proposed improved facility. To access the current launch a person has to drag their watercraft and belongings 400 feet from the nearest parking lot. When a kayaker nears the river they encounter a steep bank which drops off about 8 feet to the water. This is not ideal for either beginning or ending a journey and discourages many people from using the landing in its current condition.

Proposed improvement: In 2025, the Village hopes to complete an extension of an existing parking area (plan submitted as pdf). The improvements will locate parking adjacent to the river and allow (via ramp) an ADA compliant launch site to allow everyone the opportunity to experience the river.

The Village of Weston will complete some of the improvements with sweat-equity. Another local company is contributing surveying and design services and a group of volunteers provides river clearing activities to maintain safe navigation. This is truly a community effort which, once built, will provide generations of usage to people, both local and from afar. Our hope is that as people re-connect with the natural world they can relax and reset. Even though the river is in an urban setting, along the 4.8 mile route from Yellowbanks to the Brooks and Ross Dam takeout, a paddler can only see two houses along the route. The majority of the land ownership along this route is either large parcels or institutional, such as the Cities of Wausau and Schofield or the Girl Scouts and YMCA. Once a person reaches the flowage portion of the route, then they feel like they have entered a more urban environment

We have had discussions with the YMCA and Girl Scouts whose properties are adjacent to Yellowbanks about more fully incorporating the river basin into their programming. I could envision the camps using this landing to introduce children and even adults, in the case of The Landing, to paddling, river-reading skills, ecological and phenological information, bird watching and simple enjoyment of the outdoors in an urban environment which may lead to better stewardship of our given resources

Duplication of Services*

There are other launches along the Eau Claire River. This should be the last launch that is developed. None of the other launches, except the City of Schofield launch at the Schofield Dam have any ADA components. This launch has not been extensively used because it is 400 feet from parking, is not apparent to the general public and is a rather steep 8 foot drop to the river.

This project is located within the Village of Weston Park System and is being built and maintained by the Village.

The Village of Weston will maintain the parking facility and launch site as part of their normal maintenance. A dedicated group of individuals maintains the river for safe navigation by removing downed trees and portions of trees which impede watercraft or create unsafe conditions

Dan Higginbotham has written an article which will appear in the March issue of Silent Sports magazine Inn at the River is always promoting use of the river to their guests - they provide kayaks and shuttle services for their guests

it is hoped that a Friends group can be rekindled through Facebook or other social media which will encourage paddling and other recreational activities on the River

Discussions are on-going with the YMCA regarding incorporating river-basin oriented activities at Camp Sturtevant (located downstream of Yellowbanks) for both their youth and Landing-aged adults.

The City has also received multiple emails with safety concerns and other complaints. This project would include concrete surfacing and the addition of new modern pieces. The skateboard park would remain in its current location. Oak Island is a community parks that serves the City of Wausau and the surrounding communities. The park serves small family and group gatherings to large community events. The park also falls within a qualified census tract and provides a free public park space to the local residents. The skate park is also free and like the park, provides a space for the surrounding neighborhood to gain the social, physical and mental benefits that parks and the outdoors provide. The current skate park has some areas that if not addressed do pose safety hazards. As with any amenity there is a life expectancy of the equipment which is approximately 15 years for the ramps and 20-25 years for the concrete features. The state of the current equipment and blacktop surface is a high priority concern. If these items are unable to be addressed the result will be to shut down of the skate park. The skate park enhances the park system by providing a different type of recreational activity that cannot be found anywhere else in the City and is only one of two in the area. Providing new modern pieces of equipment will enhance the recreational experience. The skate board park could provide a location to hold skate board clinics or lessons resulting in increased revenue to recreation programs and local skate board businesses. Since this project will be to replace in existing amenity there is minimal added costs to maintenance and operations. In addition, the skate board park provides a safe place for youth and adults to recreate in our community, enhancing their quality of life.

The program will be administered by the Parks, Recreation & Forestry Department. A certified skate park designer, Spohn Ranch, has evaluated the current site and current equipment. Spohn Ranch was contracted to design the park and through the proper procurement will be constructing the park as well. To design the park, Spohn Ranch worked with department staff and key stakeholders in the community to develop preliminary plans based on space available, current equipment condition and new amenities suitable for the site. Community outreach was conducted through a series of public meetings, surveys on social media and department website to gather input on the concept plans and desired amenities. The users of the skate park were highly involved in the design process to ensure that the City is planning a park that is accessible and available to all generations. Staff has been in contact with a local skate shop owner who is extremely interested in the project and has already donated \$5,000 towards the effort. Staff will partner with the owner to communicate with the neighborhood, and current and future users of the park. The City of Wausau has committed \$225,000 of American Rescue Plan funding towards the project. The full anticipated cost of the project is \$374,600 for phase 1.With the utilization of ARPA funds the project must be complete by 2026. It is planned to have the new skate park available to users in the fall of 2025.

This project exists within a census tract that has been effected by COVID-19. This park provides a free space that is safe, benefits the social, emotional and physical well being of the users and enhances the quality of life for the neighborhood, residents of Wausau and surrounding communities. The skateboard park is a destination amenity and very important to the community. The park serves many people but specifically teenagers and young adults that do not have many other unique opportunities to be active and connect with their peers. By providing a grant to this project the Wausau and Marathon County Parks and Recreation Foundation will be contributing to enhancing the quality of life for residents of the community typically underserved. The grant will improve the safety of the skate park and provide an updated, enhanced amenity for the community.

The Village of Weston does have a skate park that may serve some of the same population as the Wausau Skate Park will serve however the Weston skate park is a difficult skate park designed for the more advanced skate boarder. The Wausau Skate Park will be a tier one facility that will include ramps and obstacles for all ages. There will be equipment for the beginner skate boarders up to the more advanced skate boarder. All of the equipment will be surface mounted and span a larger area. The Weston skate park is mainly a sunken bowl with very little variety of obstacles. In addition the two skate parks are very far apart making the Weston skate park difficult for users, especially youth in the Wausau area to get to. It is anticipated that the two skate parks will be unique enough to compliment each other.

Skateboard parks are unlike a regular playground that is gears towards the youth of our community. They can serve community members that are youth to adults of many abilities. It is a unique sport that provides many community members a gathering place and a place to be active that is different then organized sports. We have recognized in the City of Wausau that users span all ages and abilities. They become a close knit group of individuals who teach and look out for one another. A skate park can often serve youth that are typically underserved such as teenagers. It is an outlet for these youth to express themselves in a safe and healthy way. The City of Wausau has only the one skate park that is dated and in need of repair. There is currently not an alternative within the City for the population the skate park serves to engage in another activity without traveling.

He continues to assist with fund raising.

The department operates two separate park systems, and a County Forestry system each with its own facilities, objectives, and budgets.

These parks serve large areas of the county. 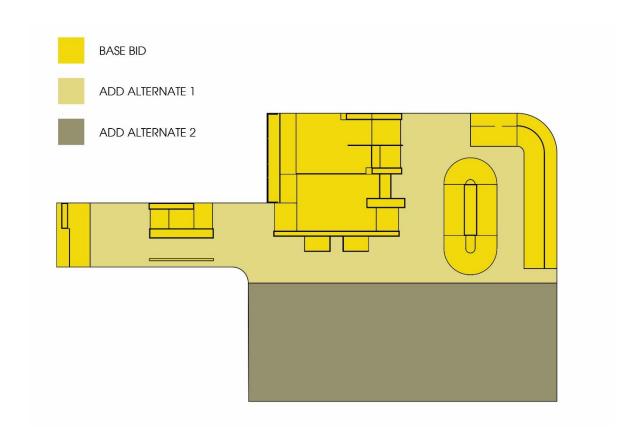

- In no event shall Spohn's liability exceed the price of the specific goods upon which the liability is based

Any Dispute including the determination of the scope or applicability of this agreement to arbitrate, shall be determined by arbitration in Los Angeles, California, before one arbitrator. At the option of the first to commence an arbitration, the arbitration shall be administered either by the American Arbitration Association (AAA) pursuant to its Commercial Rules or by JAMS pursuant to its Comprehensive Arbitration Rules and Procedures. Judgment on the Award may be entered in any court having jurisdiction. This clause shall not preclude parties from seeking provisional remedies in aid of arbitration from a court of appropriate jurisdiction. The arbitrator shall, in the Award, allocate costs, reasonable attorney's fees, expert-witness fees, other litigation fees and expenses including the costs of arbitration to the prevailing party in accordance with the Attorney's Fees provision. Judgment on any arbitration award may be entered by any court of competent jurisdiction.

 - Automobile Coverage for all Owned, Non-Owned and Hired vehicles in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, \$2,000,000 aggregate;
 - Comprehensive General Liability or Commercial General Liability insurance covering all operations or job specific in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, \$2,000,000 aggregate;
 - Excess Liability/ Umbrella Insurance in the amount of \$5,000,000;
 - Errors and Omissions/ Professional Liability insurance in the amount of \$2,000,000 per occurrence, \$2,000,000 aggregate.
- Spohn offers a 12-Month Materials and Workmanship Warranty effective upon the date of substantial completion of the project or first use by Client
- These Terms and Conditions are necessarily incorporated by reference into any other related agreement; Client agrees that California law
 shall govern the relationship between the Client and Spohn to the fullest extent of applicable law including enforcement of any part of these
 Terms and Conditions or any other related agreement between or among Client and Spohn.
- Each Term and/or Condition herein is severable in the event one or more provisions are unenforceable for any reason
